Chairman's Comment:

Tena koutou katoa

This end of year newsletter comes to you with best wishes for 2012 and a summary of activities and development since the Annual General Meeting and our last publication. This year it was good to meet many kanohi ki te kanohi (face to face).

The result of the General Election followed the poll predictions so it was not a surprise. Labour took a hammering. The Greens increased their presence, the Māori Party suffered a further loss and the Mana Party, ACT and United Future maintained a presence in Parliament. The headline news was “Winston is Back” with eight other New Zealand First members. So, interesting times ahead.



The final composition of the Government is National, ACT, United Future and the Māori Party. The Government has indicated they will reconvene Parliament prior to Christmas.

The election result itself will not impact on the Trust moving forward although the financial and economic situation internationally and nationally remains very uncertain. The Whole of Government meeting scheduled for early 2012 will be with Ministers familiar to us, although some portfolios have changed.

The level of participation in the Trust Deed review currently underway is heartening. Feedback from the hui not directly related to the review process has been taken on board and we are looking at how these will be addressed in the near future. The preference from hui so far is to have kanohi ki te kanohi meetings with members in different locations. Consideration is being given to the possibility of meetings on line or through other electronic means.

In the meantime, I would like to thank members for their continued support through these challenging establishment times for the Trust. I look forward to meeting with you in 2012. I trust you all have a safe and Happy Christmas and a great and fulfilling New Year.

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Review of the Trust Deed

At the time of approving the Port Nicholson Block Settlement Trust Deed it was agreed that a review of the terms and operation of the Trust Deed, particularly relating to the electoral process and other aspects of representation would be initiated within two years of settlement.

Trustees, in accordance with this provision initiated that process and Craig Ellison was appointed as the independent facilitator to undertake the review.

The role of the independent facilitator is to “engage and consult with Taranaki Whanui ... in order to seek the view of Taranaki Whanui ... on

the terms of the Deed and in particular the arrangements relating to the election of Trustees”.

The independent facilitator is also required to collate and review submissions and make recommendations to Trustees. The final decision as to any changes, if any, rests solely with the Trustees of the Trust.

Hui have so far been held in Wellington, New Plymouth, Auckland, Napier and Palmerston North with relatively good attendance so far. Two further Trust Review hui are being held as detailed opposite.

Whole of Government

It is the time of year where the Trust starts considering which government agencies it wants to engage with over the coming year. These relationships are determined by the strategic alignment they have with the Trust's 5 year strategic plan.

In 2011 those agencies were: Te Puni Kokiri, Department of Corrections, Department of Building and Housing and Housing New Zealand Corporation, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Social Development, Ministry for the Environment and the Department of Internal Affairs. We will be maintaining and developing these relationships.

It is important that we continue to grow and develop. Therefore we are anticipating adding relationships with:

- ♦ Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade
- ♦ Ministry of Economic Development
- ♦ Ministry of Health

Te Ara Reo (Level 2) 2011

Te Ara Reo courses for this year have now finished with a graduation planned for early next year. Ben Ngaia, Liaison Officer and Te Ara Reo Tutor commented that the 15 students who have completed the course deserve acknowledgement for this outstanding achievement.

The final assessment, the Kauhau or Prepared Speech, was a test that required a lot of courage from each student to complete, and the students excelled in this assessment, displaying the knowledge that they had obtained throughout the course's duration.

Ben is encouraged by the number of the students who wish to continue on with advancing their knowledge of te reo Māori, and enrolling in next year's course of Te Ara Reo Māori Level 3-4. He notes that learning te reo Māori and tikanga Māori is a lifelong journey.

Social Housing

Earlier in 2011 the government established a Social Housing Unit as a semi-autonomous body within the Department of Building and Housing.

The primary role of this unit is to advise, facilitate and deliver increasing involvement of third parties in social housing.

One of the key objectives is to work in partnership with Māori to develop new solutions. Several funds have been established to assist third party providers to undertake social housing initiatives. The funds can be summarised as:

The Trust in collaboration with the Wellington Tenth Trust and Palmerston North Māori Reserve are submitting applications for funding assistance to undertake social housing initiatives. Those associated with the three trusts have more than 25 years experience delivering social housing outcomes and each have land immediately available to undertake projects. The final decision in respect of projects rests with each of the Trusts.

Coming to a town near you!

The 2012 year will see the Trustees 'hit the road' for a series of hui to engage with members.

One of the issues raised at the recent Trust Deed review hui by members, particularly those who live outside of

Wellington was a desire to see and have the opportunity to talk with Trustees. Even prior to these requests being made, a decision had been made to come and meet with the members.

We look forward to providing details of the hui in the next edition of *Te Ngonga o Te Piukara* which will be with you in February. The plan is for the hui to be held in March/April 2012.

Miramar Peninsula—Te Motu Kairangi



Members may have seen recent media reports relating to a proposal that the Miramar Peninsula (76 hectares currently owned by the New Zealand Defence Force) be transformed into a national reserve/park and held in Crown ownership. The proposal does not include the land owned by the Department of Corrections and where Wellington Prison is located.

In announcing the proposal Hon Chris Finlayson said his vision was for something akin to the Presidio in San Francisco or Stanley Park in Vancouver. These

are former military installations that have become reserves where the history has been preserved and protected but where other activity also takes place. Mr Finlayson made the announcement at Fort Balance, a military installation built to ward off the threat of a Russian invasion in the 1880s and a Japanese invasion during World War II.

Three groups have been formed to consider and develop the proposal further. An “interested parties” forum is led by the Mayor Celia Wade-Brown, a

Working Group is led by the Ministry of Culture and Heritage with two representatives from the Trust and the Leadership Group which will receive the representations of the other two groups and be responsible for reporting back to Cabinet is being chaired by Sir Ngatata Love.

The ideas expressed for the protection, preservation and development of a national destination would bring together the natural environment, iwi history, national heritage, recreation, culture and the arts. Of particular importance would be the preservation of former pa sites and military sites. The development of walking and cycle tracks could also be included.

Mr Finlayson has assured the Trust that it will be consulted on all future developments in respect of the peninsula and that if there is to be any commercialisation that the Trust’s right of first refusal will be triggered. The Trust will retain a joint Kaitiaki role in whatever transpires for this significant piece of land in the capital city.

Harbour Islands Management Plan

The Harbour Islands Kaitiaki Board met at the Whare Mahana on Matiu Island on Thursday, December 1, to receive the draft management plan for the islands.

Kim Skelton and Morrie Love gave a presentation which included the results of the first phase of engagement with stakeholders. A key theme coming through from Taranaki Whanui included wanting to see the healing, restorative and peaceful nature of the islands and the indigenous flora and fauna protected and maintained. Kim and Morrie will now refine the draft management plan for presentation to the Board by mid-December with an intended release to stakeholders from mid to the end of January 2012.

Another stakeholder meeting is scheduled on Matiu Island on Saturday 11 February at 10.30am, and a whanau meeting is scheduled the following week on Matiu Island on Saturday, February 18, at 10.30am. Managing Natural Resources

A workshop for Wellington based constituents interested in adding an iwi/Māori perspective into how we manage our natural resources (particularly stormwater) in the Wellington region was held in conjunction with the Te Pane Matua Taiao, Greater Wellington on Friday, December 2, 2011.

Late last year the regional council met with Wellington tangata whenua to hear views on how they should plan for environmental management over the next ten years.

Te Pane Matua Taiao have policies and plans covering soils, waterways, wetlands and lakes, air, the coastal and marine environment, heritage and biological diversity – plants, birds, fish, lizards, and insects.

Feedback from the Wellington general community and iwi meetings told the council that storm water management and the wellbeing of the Hutt River and Wellington Harbour is a priority issue for Wellington tangata whenua, conservation groups and general community. All are concerned about pressures on the health of the Wellington harbour catchment.

In particular the council were told of concern about contamination in runoffs entering stormwater systems and cross-contamination from sewer systems. Sediment, stormwater and sewerage outflows could cause siltation and pathogens to build up in harbours and contaminate food sources, important to many people especially Māori.

Comments included: *“provide silt-control traps for earth works”*; *“don't allow massive earthworks to create flat building platforms on hillsides”*; *“submarine freshwater springs in Wellington Harbours should be declared areas of significant conservation value”*; *“[less] Treaty of Waitangi breaches”*; *“better communication between Greater Wellington and plan users”*; *“realistic regional plan objectives, policies and rules that allow for use and development ...”*

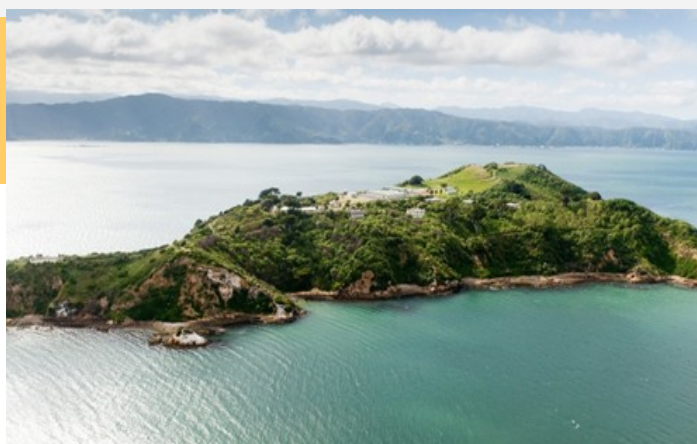
The hui allowed those present an opportunity to comment on how Te Pane Matua Taiao might incorporate not only iwi/Māori perspectives but Mana Whenuatanga perspectives into the Te Pane Matua Taiao Environmental Management plan. Points discussed included:

- ♦ Differentiating Māori, Tangata Whenua, Iwi, and Mana Whenua
- ♦ Exploring the Resource Management Act definition of Tangata Whenua and how it might be applied in the Te Pane Matua Taiao Environmental Management process
- ♦ Educating Greater Wellington in Mana Whenua perspectives and role
- ♦ Educating Resource Management Act applicants in Mana Whenua perspectives and role
- ♦ Integrating tikanga into the Greater Wellington Environmental Management process

All contributions from the workshop will be included in reports that will be published on Te Pane Matua Taiao website, and help to inform discussions about resource policies and methods.

Education—Matauranga

New educational initiatives have been developed for 2012. The initiatives are the culmination of the work of Taranaki Whanui members interested in education. The Education Working Group established and initially chaired by Dr Catherine Love and Neavin Broughton has been working in a voluntary capacity over the past 12-18 months to develop a comprehensive Taranaki Whanui Education Plan and the education initiatives to be undertaken in 2012 have emerged from this plan.

It is important that Taranaki Whanui members support the education initiatives – new and ongoing that will operate in 2012. If the initiatives are well supported by members and whanau they can operate on a long-term basis and be extended.

Te Wananga o Aotearoa

The Trust will continue to run programmes in conjunction with Te Wananga o Aotearoa as those in 2011 have been successful and will be extended in 2012. The programmes are taught by Taranaki Whanui tutors, are focused on Taranaki reo, tikanga and traditions, provide NZQA qualifications and are offered free of charge. The 2012 programmes to be offered include:

- ◆ Certificate in Waka Ama (NZQA level 4)
- ◆ Certificate in Te Ara Reo (NZQA level 2)
- ◆ Certificate in Te Ara
- ◆ Certificate in Kawai Raupapa
- ◆ Certificate in Hauora—Elderly Care
- ◆ Certificate in Business (Entrepreneurship)

Two information hui are planned for those interested in the above programmes. Full details of the programmes will be available and the opportunity to meet with tutors will be provided over a cup of tea. Sports Academy

A Sports Academy will be running from Hikoikoi in 2012. This academy is focused on rugby and netball is also run under the umbrella of Te Wananga o Aotearoa.

The academy delivers a unique combination of full time coaching, tertiary studies, training and mentoring in a disciplined environment that promotes Māori flair. The programme has three core strands:

- ◆ Rugby-Rugby League-Netball Programme – includes fitness, weights, team attack, team defence, individual positional training, individual skills, sports tactics and psychology, analysis of games, skills work, bimonthly assessment
- ◆ Career Programme - Students will study towards a Certificate in Sports Leadership (NZQA Level 4)
- ◆ Culture & Life Skills Programme – learning and living Māori culture weekly through mau rakau, taiaha, haka, waiata and tikanga.

Trust/Ministry of Education Initiatives

Early in 2012 a raft of new initiatives are being introduced and include three broad components drawn from the Trust's Strategic Plan. Those are Educating Ourselves; Educating Others; and Learning Centre:

Educating Ourselves

Many of our whanau have expressed a desire to learn more about our Taranaki Whanui culture, language, history and identity. Much of our Taranaki Whanui history and knowledge in the Wellington-Hutt Valley region is not well-known to many of us and this is primarily due to the removal of our tupuna from areas at the time of settlement.

Matauranga—Education

The partnership between the Ministry of Education and the Trust provides the opportunity for us to research and collate information, develop resources (written, CD/DVD) and provide wananga and workshops for our whanau to learn more about their history and identity in relationship to the Wellington/Hutt Valley rohe, assist with questions around identity and whakapapa, and strengthen our competence and confidence in the areas that we as mana whenua need to know. This may include providing education to our whanau on, for example; our traditional pa, papakainga and urupa sites; our karanga, waiata, kapa haka and mau-rakau, mau-taiaha, whaikorero traditions; the art of manaakitanga; mara kai and traditional food-gathering and preparation; rongoa and other areas of interest to our whanau.

Future newsletters will provide updates for Trust members, and further consultation will be undertaken to identify the priority areas that whanau want to learn about; how they prefer to learn and where wananga and workshops should be offered to our constituents.

Educating Others

A number of members have expressed their concern at the lack of knowledge and acknowledgement or respect shown by some working in the education system to Taranaki Whanui history, identity and culture.

The agreement with the Ministry of Education provides the opportunity for us to develop resources to educate the educators (teachers and staff of educational institutions, from pre-school to university level) about Taranaki Whanui identity, history and culture. There are several parts to this initiative:

- ◆ We will be developing Taranaki Whanui focused curriculum resources at appropriate levels for educational institutions in the rohe. This includes providing Taranaki Whanui input into the teaching of science, maths, history, business, music, art and other curriculum areas.
- ◆ We will be providing professional development and training for teachers in the rohe who wish to learn how to better engage, respect and work with our tamariki, rangatahi and whanau.
- ◆ We will be training and certifying interested teachers in Ahikaa pedagogy and curriculum, to increase the ability of our youth to participate in global networks with other indigenous youth, through this Taranaki Whanui developed programme.

Learning Centre

A chance for young people (aged 14-24 years) to discover and build on their strengths, to embark on their chosen career paths, and to re-ignite their passion for learning. Many of our youth have 'turned off and tuned out' from mainstream schooling. They often end up drifting, and do not fulfill their amazing potentials.

The Learning Centre provides an opportunity for young people to focus and fast-track their learning in the areas that they are interested in.

In a small, whanau like environment young people identify and explore their strengths, weaknesses, interests and goals. With guidance from kaitautoko and educationalists they identify what they need to learn, and

the qualifications they need to gain in order to achieve their goals. Together with kaitautoko, subject experts and employers, young people and their whanau develop their own programmes of learning and engage in 'internships' in the areas of their interest. With individual correspondence and face-to-face learning, alongside group activities, workplace internships and mentoring – our rangatahi will have the opportunity to reach their potential in a focused, respectful and supportive environment.

The Learning Centre is an innovative partnership between the Trust representing Taranaki Whanui, the Ministry of Education, Entrepreneurship NZ Trust and Te Kura (The NZ Correspondence School), with the Open Polytechnic and Trades Academy also joining the partnership in 2012. Relationships with ITO's (Industry Training Organisations), Business Networks and Universities also provide major opportunities within a supportive environment.
