


Strategic Plan 2040

The role will be responsible for cultural monitoring and other cultural and management responsibilities for the iReX project. On a day-to-day basis the cultural health monitor will work closely with the environmental, design and construction managers and staff and will also be a conduit for Te Au o Rehutai and the Trust.

The vision for the Kaiwharawhara terminal is that it will reflect the story of Taranaki Whānui and provide sustainable development practices to ensure the delivery of a balance of social, environmental and economic benefits.

You will be required to review a very early draft of the mokomoko management plan, ensuring a cultural overlay and the voice of Taranaki Whānui is woven throughout. You may also be required to assist with the next survey, capturing data and placement of artificial cover objects (ACO's) which we use to safely capture lizards for sampling and/or transferring.

You will work within a small group of leading Wellington experts reporting back through to the Trust and Te Au o Rehutai on progress. You will also lend your experience in this process with uri who may be working on the iReX Kororā Management Plan.

Shelly Bay Taikuru

The exciting redevelopment of Shelly Bay Taikuru is upon us with many opportunities for uri participation and where we, as uri, can bring our cultural expression, sense of place, experience, Mātauranga and narrative to life.
